

he Christmas season is a major event in the Webb household. As Charlie explains: 'My mum—who is half-American and an artist—absolutely loves "the holidays" and all the crafty creativity that comes with it. When we were growing up, the house would be completely bedecked and we had two themed trees. I've taken up those traditions, and this house lets me really indulge my love for this time of year.'

The period home that Charlie shares with husband Chris and their three children, Alfie, nine, Lily, seven, and Tommy, four, is the perfect backdrop to the twinkling lights, rustic greenery and Christmas trees

is first to admit it's taken many years and lots of hard work and determination to get to this point.

The couple first viewed the Grade II-listed house in a Kent village in 2013. It had been empty for about three years and was in a terrible state. If elt it was far too big, and there would be too much to do,' says Charlie, Six months later, the house had still not sold and they returned for another look, with members of Charlie's family in tow. 'It was so strange, but suddenly there was laughter in the house, dogs running around and children playing in the garden. Everything fell into place and I could finally imagine us living here. We didn't do anything to it at all for the first year - just enjoyed getting to know it before renovating.'

When that time came, it was to prove far from easy. 'The house was riddled with rot; we discovered that water was running behind the walls; there were new plumbing, electrics and insulation to install – the list seemed endless,' Charlie explains. 'Luckily, there's a small barn conversion in the garden, which we made our base while the first major renovation took place. It wasn't easy!'

But amid all the hard work, there were exciting finds, too. The original wall panelling in the sitting room was stripped of thick peach gloss paint; the Georgian shutters at the windows were restored; imposing fireplaces uncovered; a beautiful oak staircase revealed. Not least, a well that would originally have been sited outside, was found. This discovery, given new life with atmospheric lighting and a neat glass cover, is now a unique feature in the new kitchen floor.

This room proved to be the most difficult part of the renovation, demanding an arduous planning process and careful thought. I wanted it to be light, but still feel as if it was part of the original house,' she says.

To create the large kitchen and informal dining space the couple envisaged, the room where the old kitchen had been sited was combined with a new extension to one side. One of the most striking features here is the exposed brick wall – this is a

section of the walled gardens that encircle the house, and has been incorporated so the continuous run can be appreciated through a large picture window. 'It's one of my favourite features,' says Charlie.

When it was finally time to make decisions on decor, Charlie admits she was low on energy. 'Ineeded a supportive wing-woman to push me to be a bit braver,' she adds. She brought her close friend, interior designer Amy Maynard, on board.

We'd go off to antiques fairs, or discuss the merits of different paint shades. The décor slowly evolved, and at last the house was as I'd imagined it might look all those years ago.

The comfortable, timeless style perfectly enhances this beautiful old property. It's especially lovely in the festive season,' says Charlie. If fondly remember the Christmases of my childhood, and I hope our children feel just the same in years to come.'


